A lethal Means Panel Discussion about bringing Wisconsin's Gun Shop Project & Safe Storage Program called Live Today – Put it Away! to our local firearm retailers, gun shops, and ranges, to help prevent suicides.



September is Suicide Prevention Awareness Month

Suicide in the United States has continued to rise over the past 20 years to the point that suicides are the 10th way in which people die in this country and more people die from suicide using a firearm than do from homicides. Additionally, we know that in the Veteran community 70% die from suicide by using a firearm versus 50% in the non-Veteran population.

Statistics

- ➤ Over 50% of suicides are NOT due to a mental health disorder.
- ➤ It may be that someone is going through a **crisis**; like a divorce, missed promotion, job loss, or the feeling of hopelessness while experiencing a dire moment.






Statistics

- Most Veterans own a firearm (7 on average)
- About 33% have one in their home that is loaded
- > 70% of Veteran
 deaths by suicide are
 from using a firearm





Chuck Lovelace Veteran, Owner, Lead Gunsmith Essential Shooting Supplies, LLC Park Falls, Wisconsin


Chuck is an 18-year Disabled Veteran with the Army, Army Reserve, and Wisconsin Army National Guard. He served in Afghanistan from 2009-2010 as the Senior Army Logistics NCO for Joint Task Force Med-E based out of Bagram, spending his deployment traveling all over the country to small trauma and medical facilities within the Eastern, Southern and Northern part of Afghanistan, ensuring proper flow of supplies and equipment to these essential lifesaving teams. While in Bagram he served as the Senior Armorer and Security Team Chief for the Craig Joint Theater Hospital as well.

Chuck has been married to his wife Jennifer for 22 years and they have 2 adult sons Nate and Charlie. He is a graduate of Colorado Tech with a Bachelor Degree in Business Administration (IT Management) and a Graduate of the Sonoran Dessert Institute with an Associate Degree in Firearms Technology (CUM LAUDE).

In 2007 Chuck opened Warriors Academy of Martial Arts and ran the school for 12 years, retiring from active instruction when he sold the school in 2019. After his time in the Army, he opened Essential Shooting Supplies in 2013 in Mount Horeb WI, and in 2016 was proud to be the first Gun Shop in Wisconsin to participate in the Gun Shop Project. In 2017, with the help of Safe Communities and Jean Papalia, Chuck came up with the Safe Storage Initiative. He has since spoken multiple times to local and state level government to increase awareness and support for suicide prevention, as well as participating in the Spectrum News documentary Wisconsin, under the gun.

As a Veteran, Suicide prevention is very near and dear to his heart, having lost several comrades to the darkness as well as Family, Friends, and Customers over the years.

Chuck and Jennifer moved their shop Essential Shooting Supplies to Park Falls, WI in January 2020 where they currently reside with their two dogs enjoying the slower pace of life in Northern WI.

Bill Brassard Jr. Senior Director, Communications National Shooting Sports Foundation—the trade association for the firearms industry

Bill is in his 23rd year with the National Shooting Sports Foundation, where he serves as senior communications director and media spokesman on issues such as firearm safety, suicide prevention, shooting sports participation and conservation. Prior to joining NSSF, Bill was as a newspaper journalist and editor for nearly two decades.

Bill oversees NSSF's firearm safety education programs, including Project ChildSafe, the nationwide firearm safety education program that has distributed 40 million firearm safety kits to gun owners nationwide and that recently concluded a program funded by a \$2.4 million federal grant. He is assistant treasurer of the Project ChildSafe Foundation, a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. He oversees NSSF's ground-breaking partnership with the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention and is part of a working group on suicide prevention with the U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs.

At the NSSF-owned Shooting, Hunting and Outdoor Trade Show (SHOT Show), Bill directs the show's press operations, which services more than 2,500 accredited members of the media. He is a longtime member of the Outdoor Writers Association of America.



What is it?

The Gun Shop Project & Safe Storage Program is comprised of two parts:

- 1) The Gun Shop Project
- 2) The Safe Storage Program



Gun Shop Project

- The Gun Shop Project is an educational piece where we provide gun shop owners and staff with materials on suicide prevention.
- This includes tips on how to identify warning signs and effectively handle situations where someone appears in distress and wants to purchase a firearm.
- As well as responsible firearm ownership materials & suicide prevention resources to provide customers.



Safe Storage Program

- The Safe Storage Program is where the firearm retailer/gun shop/range provides voluntary, temporary, safe storage of a firearm for a Veteran or individual who is in a crisis.
- The goal is to provide people in crisis an option to have distance between themselves and their firearm, to decrease the impulse to use the firearm to kill themselves.

SAFE STORAGE OF FIREARMS

What to do with guns when a person may be in crisis.

FACT: Safe storage of a firearm for a loved one is a critical way to get them safely through a crisis period and is proven to save lives.

What to do when a person is in crisis? When there is an emotional crisis (like a break-up, job loss, legal trouble) or a major change in someone's behavior (like depression or anger, more drinking) that causes concern, storing guns outside the home until the situation improves may save a life.







GUN STORAGE FOR YOUR LIFESTYLE

As a gun owner, you can choose from multiple options for safely storing and protecting your firearms when they're not in use.

Use this guide to determine which mechanism best suits your lifestyle, priorities and environment.

A RANGE OF OPTIONS



CABLE LOCK

Price Range: \$10-\$50

A cable lock can be used on most firearms, allows for quick acess in an emergency and offers security from theft. The cable runs through the barrel or action of a firearm to prevent it from being accidentally fired, requiring either a key or combination to unlock it.











GUN CASE

Price Range: \$10-\$150

For those looking to conceal, protect or legally transport a registered firearm, a gun case is an affordable solution available in a variety of materials including plastic, fabric or metal. Be sure to lock it with an external device for added security.









LOCK BOX

Price Range: \$25-\$350

With integrated locks, storage boxes provide reliable protection for firearms, and allow gun owners to legally transport them outside of their home.











ELECTRONIC LOCK BOX

Price Range: \$50-\$350

Electronic lock boxes are an effective way to store or legally transport firearms, and they also prevent theft since only the person with the code can access the contents. Some electronic lock boxes are specially designed for quick access to stored firearms.



Price Range: \$200-\$2,500

Price Range: \$250 - \$300

A solution for those who need a truly secure place to store their firearm in a vehicle. These custom-fitted devices provide concealment to deter prying eyes and would-be thieves. Various access options are available, including biometric.

CARGO AREA STORAGE

Price Range: \$500 - \$1,500

Effective for transporting firearms to the range or field, cargo area storage models are available for sedans, SUVs and trucks. These devices allow for locked storage, concealment and protection from bumps and jostling.

SECURE STORAGE ACCESSORIES



WIRELESS GUN SAFE MONITOR

Price Range: \$150 - \$200

An electronic monitor can provide awareness and alert you if anyone is accessing your storage device or handling your firearm without your authorization. Some sound an audible alarm, others can be connected to your smartphone.





ELECTRONIC HOLSTERS

Price Range: \$200 - \$300

Electronic holsters are a new type of secure storage device that enable fast access along with security to prevent unauthorized access. Holsters can be mounted or used independent of a mounting system and feature a programmable finger or thumbprint scan.



Gun Shop Project And Safe Storage Program

The Program is designed to assist gun shops in working with the gun owner community to provide 2 levels of support to help address firearm suicides:

- 1) Firearm suicide prevention safety information: Gun shops are providing materials to their customers and staff about Suicide Prevention and responsible firearm ownership developed by national organizations (National Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF), American Foundation on Suicide Prevention, and the VA). Contact us at CaptainJohnDMasonProgram@mcw.edu if you would like a packet of free materials from the NSSF.
- 2) Firearm storage outside of the home: Live today Put it Away! The gun shops on the map provide customers firearm storage for a low fee. This service has been developed to assist individuals that are in a crisis to voluntarily store their firearms outside of the home

Message to Gun Shops: We need your help! Please sign up, so your establishment can be placed on the map so that individuals, mental health providers, family, and friends will see that you are part of a suicide prevention solution. Once you sign the agreement someone will contact you within 48 hours to place your establishment on the map.



Instructions for anyone using the storage map:

The firearm facilities noted on the map are voluntarily providing this service and can refuse to provide storage for anyone. Please call and check whether the facility is providing the gun storage service prior to referring someone in crisis to a firearm store. Be sure that you have the firearm(s) unloaded, when you take them in
